Option 2 - An approved historical Internship ([\[INTE 394\]](#)/[\[INTE 395\]](#)) of up to nine credits during the academic year or during the summer in one of the following areas: Archives, Museums, Historical Libraries and Societies, Historical Preservation, Historical Research, Public History, or Richmond University Internships in London.
