The history course(s) will count toward either the core requirements or the elective requirements, and therefore will result in no net increase in credits required for the major. Option 2 - An approved historical Internship ([\[INTE 394\]](#)/[\[INTE 395\]](#)) of up to nine credits during the academic year or during the summer in one of the following areas: Archives, Museums, Historical Libraries and Societies, Historical Preservation, Historical Research, Public History, or Richmond University Internships in London.
