The Pre-Health Professions Advising Committee uses this form to gather information for your composite letter of recommendation. Only members of the committee will see this form. It will not be seen by any medical school admissions committee, although portions of it may be used by the committee in your composite letter. The committee is most interested in information that is not revealed by your grades or MCAT scores. This is your chance to demonstrate to the committee your unique qualifications and experiences that make you a strong candidate for medical school. # **III. Recommendation Letters**

List the names and addresses of the people from which the committee will receive letters of recommendation. Two

reference letters are mandatory, but **four** are <u>strongly suggested</u> so that the best possible composite letter can be written. Of these references, at least *two* should be from faculty members (at least *one* of these from a Messiah science faculty member – hopefully someone who taught you in an upper level course), and the other two from people who have known you well in the <u>recent</u> past. As a graduate, it is very important that you account for your time between graduation and the time of your application. One way to do this is through the careful selection of post-graduation recommendation letter-writers. Two versions of the reference letters have been requested: an original hard copy that is signed and on letterhead stationary, and an electronic version sent to <u>msmith@messiah.edu</u>. Please note: It is **your** responsibility to make sure that I have received these letters at least one week prior to your committee letter interview. Committee letter interviews are *mandatory* and will be scheduled on a first come, first served basis.

In addition to these letters of recommendation, I will also need a paragraph describing your relationship to your postgraduation letter-writers. Please be as specific as possible, including dates and hours worked, as well as a detailed description of the nature of your work or research, if applicable. The purpose of this information is to enable me to quote from your recommendation letters in a meaningful way. Your comments will provide the framework for the quotation, and in some cases will be quoted verbatim.

#### **IV. Academic Information**

An unofficial copy of your transcript from <u>all</u> post-secondary schools attended should be stapled to this packet. Messiah College transcripts can be obtained from the Registrar. Feel free to add additional pages as necessary.

**V. Co-Curricular Activities** (This is a very important section and your thoughtful treatment of it is vital. We use this information to distinguish you from other medical school applicants. This section provides the non-numerical information for your committee letter. You should divide your comments into two categories: undergraduate and graduate activities.)

1. *Leadership*. List and describe any leadership position(s) that you have held and how long you held them. What were your responsibilities? How was the organization strengthened/changed by your leadership? What did you learn from the experience that will make you a stronger candidate?

2. *Medically Related Experiences*. Describe any medically related experiences that you have had including, but not limited to, jobs, internships, shadowing and research. Be as specific as possible. Include names, dates, places and hours worked. This might also include any significant illness that you or someone close to you has experienced that has influenced your decision to go to medical school. This is a very important section, especially if you have had an experience since graduation that has galvanized your desire to go to medical school.

3. *Non-Medical Activities* (Clubs, Sports, Travel, Music, etc.) In the space provided list the <u>main</u> activities that you are/were involved in and how long you have participated in them. Do not use abbreviations.

4. *Summer Experiences*. Describe how you spent your summer vacations. Include a detailed reflection of the experience if you will be receiving a recommendation from someone involved with it.

- a. Summer after first year.
- b. Summer after sophomore year.
- c. Summer after junior year.

- d. Summer after senior year. (If applicable.)
- e. Post-graduation experiences .

5. Tell us five things about yourself that you would like the committee to convey in your composite letter of recommendation. The sky is the limit. Be yourself. Be honest.

#### VI. Essay

In a thoughtful and organized manner, please write a one page essay entitled **Why I Want to Go To Medical School**. While this essay will not be forwarded to any medical schools, portions of it may be quoted in your composite letter of recommendation and you may eventually choose to use all or part of it in your AMCAS essay. This is your chance to distinguish yourself among the other applicants. Write about what interests you and what excites you about medicine. Use concrete examples. Grab the attention of the reader, be clear in your intentions, and make the reader want to meet you in person. Proper syntax, grammar and punctuation are of paramount importance, so it would be a good idea to have this essay proofread by a few knowledgeable and trusted individuals before submitting it to the committee. #### VII. Other Details

- □ Due to the rolling admissions policy of **most** medical schools, it is very important that you submit your AMCAS/AACOMAS application <u>as early as allowable</u>, ideally during the first week of May for Osteopathic Medical Schools and the first week of June for Allopathic Medical Schools. If you decide to apply as an early assurance applicant, let me know right away.
- I must have the following materials in my office prior to writing your committee letter:
- A copy of your AMCAS/AACOMAS application,
- an official MCAT score report either electronic or a paper copy of your <u>official score report</u>,
- at least two recommendation letters,
- a copy of your transcript(s) that includes grades from all courses taken to date,
- this completed PIF including an electronic version of your PIF essay, and
- all required waiver forms.

The office of Pre-Health Professions Advising is a busy one, and it may take several weeks from the time you register with the Office until your committee letter is finalized by the Pre-Health Professions Advising Committee. It is consequently very important that you begin the process early.
