Exploring Civil Rights Through Artifacts: David Crane at Messiah University

On February 3rd, Messiah University will welcome David Crane, author of *Making the Movement: How Activists Fought for Civil Rights with Buttons, Fliers, Pins, and Posters*. Crane will speak at 7 PM in Hostetter Chapel, sharing insights into how grassroots activism shaped the Civil Rights Movement through creative and powerful visual messaging. In addition to his presentation, Crane brings his traveling museum of artifacts, a fascinating collection of memorabilia from the era that highlights the role of design and storytelling in social justice movements.

The museum will be on display in Murray Library from January 24 through February 4, offering a unique opportunity to explore these historical treasures up close.

Additionally, Dwayne Magee from Messiah Press facilitated the printing of <u>A Place for All People: Introducing the National</u> <u>Museum of African American History and Culture</u> from the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service.

Celebrating our Library Student Workers' Digital History Projects

We are excited to highlight the exceptional work of three of our library student workers who recently participated in Dr. David Pettegrew's Digital History fall course. As part of this course, they helped digitize historical documents and developed digital projects that delved into themes of historical reconciliation, restoration, and justice in Pennsylvania's capital region. Their work is an important contribution to preserving and sharing the history of Harrisburg and beyond. Their final StoryMaps projects are linked below.

Maddie Graham, a sophomore majoring in Public History and minoring in Art History, explored the <u>life and legacy of Judge</u> <u>Genevieve Blatt</u>, a prominent Pennsylvanian politician.

Emmy Varner, a senior majoring in Public History and minoring in Creative Writing and Education, focused on the submissions that tell the story of <u>Pennsylvania's state quarter</u>, capturing the symbolism and history behind its design and meaning.

Phoebe Lemin, a December 2024 graduate with a Public History major with an Art History minor, worked on the <u>life and</u> <u>contributions of Mira Lloyd Dock</u>, a key figure in the City Beautiful Movement in Harrisburg.

The course gave these students the opportunity to digitize original sources, visit local archives, write blog posts, and develop Story Maps to showcase their work. Phoebe shared, "Just knowing that I have digitized sources that no one else has seen online is fascinating to me as I never would have imagined that I would be capable of digitizing documents for my own website." Their research was supported by secondary sources, many of which were Murray Library resources like books, digitized newspapers, and journal articles from *The Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography* and *Pennsylvania History: A Journal of Mid-Atlantic Studies*.

We are proud of Maddie, Emmy, and Phoebe for their hard work, creativity, and dedication. Their contributions not only enrich online access to digital collections but also help bring important local history to the fingertips of the community. We appreciate their curiosity and the thoughtful ways they engage with history and bring this energy to our library team. Cite it Right with the Updated Chicago Citation Style

The Chicago Manual of Style has released its 18th edition, bringing several important updates and clarifications for academic writing. Key changes include:

- **Page Range in an Edited Book** The page range for a cited chapter in an edited book is no longer required in a bibliography (page range is still required for journal articles).
- Place of Publication for Books A place of publication is no longer required in citations of books.
- Ibid. Chicago recommends a shortened citation instead of "ibid."
- Journal Article Dates Only include the publication year, a month or season can now usually be omitted in citations of journal articles.
- Shortened URLs Do not use TinyURL or Bitly to shorten URLs. Retain domain names.
- Citing Al Generated Content See new guidance on citing Al-generated content.

The 18th edition is <u>now available at the library</u>, both in print and online. We encourage educators, students, and staff to explore the latest updates to ensure accurate, consistent citation and formatting in your work. As always, when using the pre-formatted citation option in Primo or any databases, double check the accuracy of your citation. When in doubt, ask a librarian at <u>library@messiah.edu</u>
