# **Program Outcomes Report for 2020-2021 Academic Year**

## I. <u>Program Updates</u>

Despite continuing challenges related to the pandemic, the Messiah University Graduate Program in Counseling continues to grow and demonstrate positive outcomes for students and graduates.

- The program welcomed one new faculty member in the fall of 2021. Dr. Tracey Duncan joined the Marriage, Couple and Family Counseling track so we continue to have 10 full-time faculty. Dr. Duncan's bio can be found <u>here</u>. We are also thankful to the excellent new and long-time adjunct faculty as well as three departmental staff members who are essential to keeping our program strong.
- Although our program is mostly online, we are still significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Intensive courses continue to have a completely online format though we are hoping to have in person courses on campus in July.

D. National Counselor Exam (NCE) 2020-2021 Academic Year

Historically, students in all three tracks of the Counseling program have taken the National Counselor Exam before graduation.

Pass rates by track: School Counseling 7 of 7 (100%), Marriage Couple and Family Counseling 13 of 14 (93%), and Clinical Mental Health Counseling 33 of 37 (89%)

## E. <u>Praxis II</u>

Professional School Counselor exam required of School Counseling students in order to become certified school counselors in Pennsylvania.

During the 2020-2021 academic year, 100% of the students who took the Praxis II exam passed.

**B.** <u>Geography:</u> The Counseling Program has students in 30 states in addition to District of Columbia, and the Pacific district of the Military. Pennsylvania has the most students with 150. Maryland, Texas, New Jersey, and Virginia have the next most students.
