PROGRAM NOTES

Katahj Copley describes "Halcyon Hearts" as "an ode to love and how it affects us all... We all are united with the common thread of passion from the heart". Copley dedicates the work to those who love in spite of negativity, hatred, or evil that exists in the world. Halcyon denotes a time in which a person is ideally happy or at peace, and the work evolves into a celebration of one finding their love or passion. Copley utilizes warm major 7th chords, long and lyric melodic lines, and engaging rhythmic motifs that feed into the natural energy of the ensemble as the sonic journey in love unfolds.

Ralph Vaughan Williams, a prominent English composer, is perhaps best known for his symphonies and large-scale works. After working with the Salvation Army Brass Band in the early 1950's, Williams was so impressed with the musicianship of the group he composed a work specifically for them. The resulting work, "Prelude on Three Welsh Hymn Tunes", utilized *Ebenezer*, *Calfaria*, and *Hyfrdol*. Williams sought to capture the vocal-like quality of the brass band utilizing these three well known hymn tunes. These three hymn tunes are found in many hymnals as "Oh the Deep, Deep, Love of Jesus" (*Ebenezer*), "Lord Enthroned in Heavenly Splendor" (*Calfaria*), and "Come Thou Long Expected Jesus" (*Hyfrydol*). The setting for wind band was completed by James Curnow.

In 2004, Dwayne Milburn was asked to write a piece in memory of Nick Stegeman, an important member in the Calvin Christian Schools community in Michigan. "Meditation" serves as the middle movement of a suite that Milburn entitled "Music for Bright Youth". It combines the Lutheran hymn *If Thou but Suffer God to Guide Thee* with American folk song *Poor Wayfarin' Stranger* in an emotional outpouring that seeks to find peace despite the loss of a loved one.

In 1908 at the Boston Food Fair, John Philip Sousa and his band debuted "The Fairest of the Fair". The inspiration for the work can be traced back a year earlier. Sousa took note of the beauty and charm of a young lady at the fair. He decided that he would one day transfer his impressions of her into music. When the invitation to perform at the fair arrived (a 22-day engagement), Sousa began preparing new music for the performances. Part of his summer in 1908 while on vacation in the Adirondack resort at Saranac Lake, NY was spent crafting what many conductors consider his best melodic writing among his marches. It is an inspired piece in the traditional march form that has maintained its popularity with each new generation.
