Several faculty members and 17 students from the human development and family science department attended the National Council on Family Relations Conference in Pittsburgh Nov. 6 to 10. **Debra L. Berke**, professor of family science and women's studies, presented two papers "Using Multiple Intelligences to Address the Needs of Diverse Audiences: A Multicultural Educational Framework" and "Work-Family Intersections Over the Life Course: How Family Friendly are Academic Institutions?" with Rona Karasik, St. Cloud State University, and Scott Scheer, Ohio State University. Berke was on the Public Policy Pre-Conference Planning Committee, coordinated a panel of qualitative researchers for the Qualitative Family Research Network session, as well as served as a discussant for a paper session titled "Teaching About Families." Berke began her three year term of service on the National Council on Family Relations' Board of Directors at this year's annual conference meeting.

Erin Boyd-Soisson, assistant professor of human development and family science, chaired a symposium, "Multiple Means for Teaching About Family Vulnerability and Diversity," and co-presented a paper with **Mary Ann Hollinger**, dean of external programs, on "Using Family Folklore to Examine Family Identity, Strengths, and Diversity." Hollinger also served as chair of the awards committee for the Jan Trost Award for Outstanding Contributions to Comparative Family Studies, and made the presentation to the award recipient at one of the conference plenaries. **Raeann R. Hamon**, distinguished professor of family science and gerontology, presented two papers "Family Science Department and Career Center Collaborations: Partnerships Which Benefit Family Science Students," with Deb Snyder, Grove City College, and "Using Family Stress Theory to Teach about Family Vulnerabilities and Resilience," with Robert Reyes, Goshen College, and Laura Clark, HDFS senior. Hamon was also asked to preside at and speak on "Why You Need an NCFR Affiliated Council and How to Get One Started" at the breakfast for presidents/representatives of Student Affiliated Councils. In addition,

Hamon was hospitality chair, serving as coordinator for the hospitality room and silent auction, which raised \$371.50 to benefit Family Service Partners of Harrisburg. Hamon concluded her term as past president of the Association of Councils and assumed her new role as program chair-elect. **Abraham Hwang**, associate professor of human development and family science, presented one paper, "Dispelling the Stereotypes About "Model Minority" Among Asian Americans," and one poster, "Paternal Involvement among Caucasian and African-American Low Income Fathers: Existing Vulnerability and Potential Resources," with Robert Reyes, Goshen College.

Ted Davis, professor of the history of science, spoke at West Chester University on Nov. 27. His talk was about the religious life and views of Samuel Christian Schmucker, who taught science at WCU in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The science building at WCU is named for Schmucker. His grandfather, Samuel Simon Schmucker, was the leading American Lutheran theologian of the 19th century and the founder of the college and seminary in Gettysburg. Schmucker was one of the most popular writers and speakers of the time on topics related to science, including science and religion.

Beth M. Transue, librarian/collection development coordinator, presented a workshop titled "Health Information on the Internet: Exploring and Evaluating Online Resources" at the Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners' annual conference.

Michael True, director of the Internship Center, spoke on Nov. 9 at the University of New Haven in Connecticut. In the morning he addressed employers on how to create quality internship programs. He then met with their experiential education staff, and in the afternoon spoke to faculty about Messiah's internship program. UNH is seeking to model their program after Messiah's.

Cynthia A. Wells, Boyer Fellow/assistant professor of interdisciplinary studies, co-authored a research article, "Outcomes for Institutions of Academic and Student Affairs Partnership Programs," with Becki Elkins Nesheim, Cornell College; Melanie Guentzel, St. Cloud State University; Angela Kellogg, University of Wisconsin-Madison; William McDonald, Presbyterian College; and Elizabeth J. Whitt, University of Iowa. Wells presented the paper at the Association for the Study of Higher Education. This manuscript stems from the Boyer Partnership Assessment Project, which was funded by a grant from the Fund for the Improvement of Post-Secondary Education (FIPSE) awarded to The Ernest L. Boyer Center.

Reminder about fire marshall and safety inspections

As mentioned in the previous "Intercom," the Upper Allen Township fire marshall will be performing inspections throughout campus to determine if Messiah is in compliance with fire and safety codes. The inspections will be performed on a regular basis and focusing on different areas each month. Hilary Kreider, environmental health and safety manager, and John Fite, fire safety systems coordinator, will be assisting the fire marshall with the inspections and will be performing re-inspections where violations are found. One of the violations noted during the most recent inspections was the improper set up of power strips. Power strips must be placed on a flat surface or mounted onto a surface; they must not be hanging. This is in violation of International Fire Code (IFC) 605.3. If you have a power strip that is hanging, please place it on a flat surface or have it mounted. Fines can be assessed up to \$1,000 per day per occurrence. Search Engine creates revenue for the charity or school of your choice — When Board Member Kenneth Ramberg’s mother passed away to cancer in 2001, he became involved with a number of charitable organizations but quickly realized how difficult it was for these groups to raise money. So he explored his two passions, the Internet and charity, and created “GoodSearch.” GoodSearch.com is a search engine (powered by Yahoo!) that donates 50 percent of its revenue to the charity or school of the user’s choice. The revenue is distributed to the organization based on how many times supporters of that charity or school use the site. “We estimate that a charity with 1,000 supporters searching the Internet twice a day will receive \$7,300 at the end of the year. The more people who use the site, the more money an organization can earn. The sky is the limit!” said Ramberg. “It’s really a very simple concept; the site provides people a way to support their favorite organization just by searching the Internet.”

Follow these simple steps and support a charity or school or your choice.

1. Log on to www.goodsearch.com.
2. Write in the charity of your choice in the second box on page.
3. Hit “Verify” after highlighting your charity.
4. Search the Internet as you would normally.
5. “GoodSearch” in most instances will remember the organization you are supporting upon reentering to the “GoodSearch” site.

Student-Athletes and Missing Classes for Athletics Competition

As a Division III institution, Messiah College emphasizes the academic success of each of our student-athletes. Our student-athletes are here, first and foremost, to receive an outstanding education. And we recognize that cocurricular activities and intercollegiate athletics have a significant positive effect on those students who choose to participate in them.

We want to work with our faculty in assuring opportunities for successful academic performance. All of us also recognize that there will be occasional conflicts between the students' academic and athletics responsibilities. We expect our student-athletes to seek assistance in advance and to resolve any potential conflicts when a scheduled contest results in a missed class.

We expect that students will prioritize academic responsibilities over athletics practice sessions. In general, the daily time of intercollegiate practices is 4 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. There will, however, be days when an athletics contest conflicts with class time. Our student-athletes have been made aware that they may be required to submit completed assignments early; they know that they are also responsible to communicate with faculty prior to the date of competition.

We respectfully ask that faculty members do not penalize student-athletes for missing class due to athletic competition. Our intercollegiate athletics program is sponsored and endorsed by the College as an official program. Our student-athletes are responsible for completing all class work as they represent Messiah well..

Included in this issue of **FALCONOTES** is a list of athletics contests for our five winter sports teams: women's basketball, men's basketball, women's indoor track and field, men's indoor track and field, and wrestling. It includes the times when student-athletes need to be excused from class. Please know that a conscientious attempt to limit the number of missed classes has been made, and we would remind faculty that, due to unpredictable weather, there may be dates when a student-athlete's contest will be postponed and rescheduled. Such rescheduling in the winter is highly unlikely, though travel conditions could postpone a game. Again, the student-athlete is responsible to communicate these changes to the professor and to be in class if a game is postponed.

Faculty members should contact the Athletics Office or the student-athlete's head coach if there are questions or concerns. We also want to know if a student-athlete is experiencing academic difficulty—the sooner we know, the sooner we can work with that individual to resolve the issue.

Please know that we appreciate faculty cooperation and assistance. And we appreciate this

opportunity to partner together in providing the best education possible for these men and women who so well represent Messiah in intercollegiate competition. Our head coaches are:
