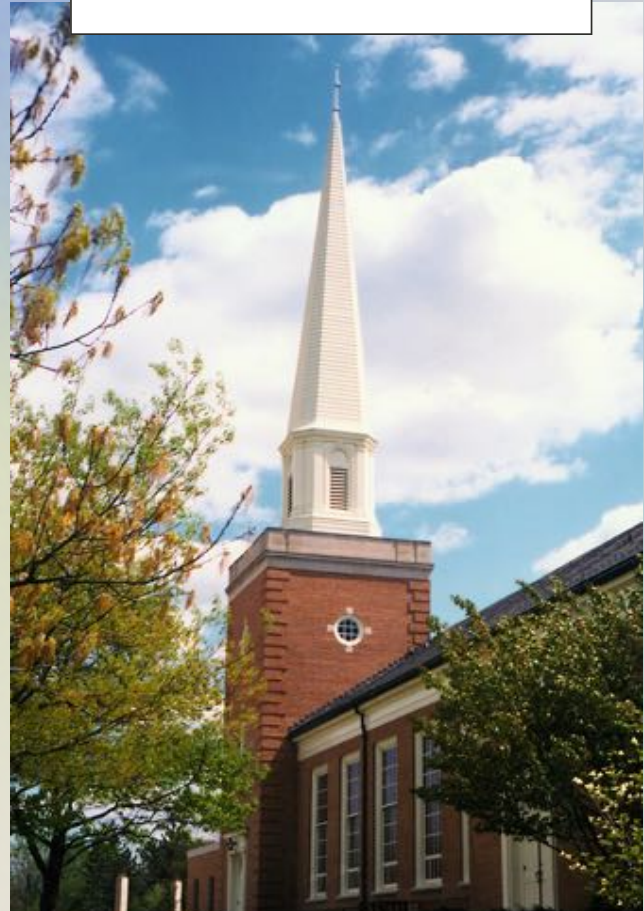

A STATEMENT FROM DR. LING DINSE,
DSW, MSW, LSW



It is an honor to greet you as the new Department Chair of Social Work. I have been a licensed social worker for almost three decades and continue to see the value of my chosen profession. I believe social work training equips us to meet the needs of our increasingly complex world, and the profession's six core values encourage us to engage the world to reflect the love and compassion of Jesus. LEAD DAY

MARCH 19, 2024

Professor Tara Piechowicz, the policies class, and any additional students had the opportunity to travel to the PA Capitol and participate in LEAD Day. Legislative Education and Advocacy Day (LEAD) is an annual event hosted by NASW-PA, where close to 1,000 social work students and professionals gather to advocate for legislation that is relevant to the social work profession. This year the house was voting upon the Social Work Licensure Compact Model Legislation HB 1500. The compact permits eligible social workers to practice in others states that are under the compact.

Upon arriving at the Capitol there was a rally on the front steps and legislators gave speeches encouraging social workers and describing the importance of the Social Work Licensure Compact Model Legislation HB 1500 and the Minimal Wage Bill. Then students had the privilege of meeting with Senator Maria Collett. Throughout the day students had the ability to learn about the capitol's policies and bureaucracy.



IPE Spotlight: Disaster Drill

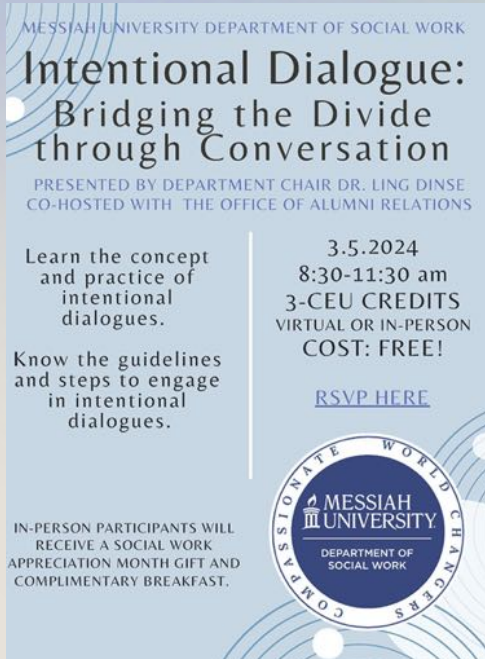
MARCH 7, 2024

Professor Michelle George and the Social Work sophomore class partnered with the Department of Nursing to participate in their annual disaster drill. The students attended a pre-brief with the senior nursing students who were acting as first-responding nurses. During the pre-brief, the social work students learned about the basic structure and processes of the disaster drill, and what the roles of the nurses are. During the drill, the social work students stepped into their roles as social workers and provided care for victims and support for nursing team members. The students utilized critical thinking other social work skillsets to provide care. Afterward, all participating faculty and students attended a debrief. Many of the nursing students, both those who were acting as nurses and those who were victims, expressed that they found Social Work's participation in the event to be influential. Many of the students who were playing disaster victims expressed that having emotional and spiritual support from the social workers helped them to see how social workers can provide aid during a crisis situation.

CEU WORKSHOP

MARCH 5, 2024

Messiah University Department of Social Work hosted a CEU Workshop. The Department of Social Work Chair, Dr. Ling Dinse spearheaded this initiative. The Department partnered with the Office of Alumni Relations to host the event. The event aimed to engage the local community of social workers, provide an affordable option for continued education, and give back to Social Work Alumni. The program will offer interdisciplinary focus areas in mental health, health or leadership in organizations. Coursework is 100% online.”
