A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

When Beth Henley's *Crimes of the Heart* received the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1981, it made Henley the first women to receive a Pulitzer for Drama in 23 years, and the first playwright ever to receive the award before the play opened on Broadway. This after she struggled to find a venue for the play. Unknown to her, however, a friend had entered it in the well-known "Great American Play Contest" of the Actors' Theatre of Louisville. The play was chosen as co-winner and performed in February 1979, at the company's annual festival of New American Plays. The production was extremely well-received, and the play was picked up by numerous regional theatres for their 1979-81 seasons before moving to Off-Broadway. Clearly, despite early rejection, her play was resonating with audiences of the day.

Henley chooses to set her play in the small town of Hazlehurst, Mississippi, a town much like the Mississippi town in which she was raised. Interestingly, she chose the year 1974 – shortly after the U.S failed campaign in Vietnam, shortly after the resignation of disgraced President Richard Nixon, amidst the energy crisis, and amidst continued social upheaval. Yet the world of this play seems untouched by all this. These characters seem to live as if it is 1964 rather than 1974. It shows in the patriarchy of their world, even though the most dominant male influences in the lives of the Magrath sisters never even appear in the play. It shows in the "Southerness" of the play, particularly in the sense of public reputation and in the language of the play, language that Henley would know to be distasteful even in 1981. And it also shows in the issues of self-identity among the Magrath sisters.

It is hard to imagine that Henley was not influenced by Susan Glaspell's 1916 play *Trifles*, which also focuses on women surrounding the murder of an abusive husband, possibly by his wife, and also takes place entirely in the kitchen. The play also bears striking similarities to Sam Shepard's 1978 Pulitzer Prize winning play *Buried Child* in its themes of how our "crimes" impact us over time and whose characters also seem untouched by the world beyond them. Perhaps Henley, like Shepard, is asking us to consider how our own past crimes, individually and collectively, are manifest in our present. We may be through with the past. But the past is not through with us.

SILENT SKY Written by Lauren Gunderson, Directed by Daniel Inouve

When Henrietta Leavitt begins work at the Harvard Observatory in the early 1900s, she isn't allowed to touch a telescope or express an original idea. Instead, she joins a group of women "computers," charting the stars for a renowned astronomer who calculates projects in "girl hours" and has no time for the women's probing theories. As Henrietta, in her free time, attempts to measure the light and distance of stars, she must also take measure of her life on Earth, trying to balance her dedication to science with family obligations and the possibility of love. The true story of 19th-century astronomer Henrietta Leavitt explores a woman's place in society during a time of immense scientific discoveries, when women's ideas were dismissed until men claimed credit for them. Social progress, like scientific progress, can be hard to see when one is trapped among earthly complications; Henrietta Leavitt and her female peers believe in both, and their dedication changed the way we understand both the heavens and Earth. **Poorman Black Box Theater Oct. 6 – 8 at 8pm; Oct. 9 at 3 pm**

Steel Magnolias is set over the span of 3 years and tells the story of a group of friends, neighbors, and clients of hairstylist, Truvy Jones. The beginning of the play focuses on young Shelby who is preparing for her upcoming wedding. As Shelby's story progresses, we learn about her struggles with Type 1 diabetes, and her mother's concern about her leaving the nest and starting a family of her own. Although the ladies argue and tease each other, their friendship and sense of community holds them together. We see this at various points of crisis during the play and, ultimately, at the end when Shelby decision to go against her doctor's orders and have a child has dire consequences.

CRIMES OF THE HEART Written by Beth Henley, Directed by Ed Cohn

The scene is Hazlehurst, Mississippi, where the three Magrath sisters have gathered to await news of the family patriarch, their grandfather, who is living out his last hours in the local hospital. Lenny, the eldest, never left Hazlehurst -- she is the caretaker of the sisters' cantankerous Old Granddaddy. Meg, the middle sister, left home to pursue stardom as a singer in Los Angeles, but has, so far, only found happiness at the bottom of a bottle. And Babe, the youngest, has just been arrested for shooting her abusive husband, Zackery Botrelle. Their troubles, grave and yet somehow hilarious, are highlighted by their priggish cousin, Chick, and by the awkward young lawyer who tries to keep Babe out of jail. Under the scorching heat of the Mississippi sun, past resentments bubble to the surface and each sister must come to terms with the consequences of her own "crimes of the heart."
