"Messiah University Social Work students make significant impacts on the local and global community for Christ. Students have engaged the world with the love of Jesus using interventions integrated with professional, ethical and competent social work approaches. Approximately 7500 hours of service learning and field experiences will be conducted by the end of the 2023 spring semester. Student's have been placed in settings including urban and rural schools, community outreach, **Professor George** Debbie Chopka Dr. Lane women's shelters, retirement communities, foster care and adoption agencies, drug and alcohol treatment programs, faith based community social service, hospice, residential schools and district attorney offices. A student is in an international placement in Ecuador and students are also participating in a new partnership with the Baltimore Urban Studies Program. An essential component of preparing to be a professional social worker at Messiah University is the focus on service learning and field engagement included in the majority of social work courses. Through these field experiences, students live out the values of the social work profession while advancing the gospel serving as the hands and feet of Christ to a broken and hurting world. Students learned about Tevera, a new field placement database, which organizes all timesheets, learning contracts, and evaluations that was successfully implemented in the department this year.








SOCIAL WORK CLUB




STUDY ABROAD

Chicago.




SOPHOMORE FIELD PLACEMENT

"One thing I love about my sophomore field placement is the diversity of experiences I get to encounter through my agency. From creating Lifebooks and making phone calls to attending adoption hearings and home visits, I get to practice in the many areas of foster care and adoption. All the opportunities that I have through my placement have helped me to grow into a more professional and competent social worker through opening my eyes to the many roles that are necessary to help meet the needs of children in foster care." -Olivia Winton, BSW 2025



Students completing their sophomore placements will participate in

50 hours of practice in both their fall and spring semester at the same organization, resulting in 100 hours of experience in social work practice under the supervision of an experience social worker.



"My sophomore field placement is at Masonic Villages Hospice in Elizabethtown. I spend most of my time at MVH making visits to hospice patients. Some patients are very conversational and with other patients I simply offer supportive presence. I have also had the opportunity to attend trainings, observe bereavement groups, and perform documentation tasks. I have had several opportunities to observe interdisciplinary team meetings of social workers, medical staff, and chaplains. My field placement often takes me outside my comfort zone. However, this is where growth and learning happen." -Darren Miller, BSW 2024

SENIOR FIELD PLACEMENT

Elaine Brandenburg (Social Work Alumna Class of 2022), completed her senior placement at the Dauphin County District Attorney's Office and is currently working as a social worker in Nepal. Hear about how her senior placement provided her tangible skills and experiences that prepared her for her first job as a social worker!



Students completing their senior placements will participate in 450 hours of practice in both their spring semester of their senior year under the supervision of an experienced social worker.

"My senior placement at the Dauphin County District Attorney's Office was incredible. Not only did I get first hand experience working with clients but I

also learned the importance of a multidisciplinary team which included attorneys, detectives, doctors, police officers, and other professionals. My senior placement was emotionally intense which taught me firsthand the importance of self-care. No longer was self-care a catch phrase or something I heard about in university, but something I needed to put into practice. Overall, I'd say my placement prepared me in a lot of ways to be a social worker, especially how to adapt to new environments, including my work now as a social worker and researcher in Nepal!

I've been living in Nepal for nearly 6 months now and I have grown so much personally and professionally. Currently I work with women from all over Nepal with severe psychosocial disabilities, mostly schizophrenia. The women often are from villages where mental health services are practically nonexistent and religious stigma surrounding mental illness exists. Working with all Nepalis, living with Nepalis, and going to Church with Nepalis has helped me to immerse myself in the culture and the language. Although I still have much to learn, my daily work includes me speaking and understanding Nepali. In addition to growing my language skills, I've had the opportunity to see how the mental health system (or the lack thereof) works here in Nepal, including barriers women face."

Without my Messiah education, I can truthfully say I do not believe I would be able to walk into each new experience that I encounter with the same level of confidence that I currently have, because I know I am well-prepared."
