#### PROGRAM NOTES

*Jubilant Flourishes* is a concert opener written in 2012. The piece is structured as a concert opener in an adapted sonata form. After a bold introduction, a buoyant melody first stated by tenor saxophone, trombone, and euphonium is surrounded by a series of fanfares and rapid, flourishing passages from the woodwinds. The middle section of the work offers a harmonic contrast as the melodic material shifts from major to minor tonality. A recapitulation of the secondary theme ushers back in the main theme before the piece is punctuated by brief and energetic codetta.

Frank Erickson is perhaps best known for his lyric work *Air for Band* (published in 1956, and later revised in 1966). While that work set a standard for expressive playing in lyric works for young band, Erickson's *Toccata for Band* is well-established in the repertoire as well. Erickson created a work that connects to aspects of its eponym, retains a unique form, and contains a unique modal melodic language. The opening motif of the piece found in upper woodwinds and trumpets bears the characteristics associated with a toccata keyboard work from the 16th century. One of the more prominent aspects of the work is Erickson's use of Dorian mode, which is prominent in the opening motif and in some of the transitional material.

*Rainbow Variations* is written by Garrett Hoffman (b. 1999). Hoffman is teacher, composer, and musician based in Pittsburgh, PA. A recent graduate of Duquense University's Mary Pappert School of Music, he received his B.S. in Music Education whilst being a proud recipient of the prestigious Chancellor's Award. Hoffman puts a basic musical theme through a series of variations, each intended to represent a different color with a symbolic association. The order of the variations begins with Red (passion), Orange (energy), Yellow (happiness), Green (personal envy), Blue (melancholy), and Violet (royalty).

Composer Randall Standridge set this hymn as a means of comfort for people in response to the tumultuous events of 2020. The hymn tune *Matiland* was composed by George Allen (who studied with Lowell Mason) and the lyrics for *Precious Lord*, *Take* My *Hand* were written by Reverend Thomas Dorsey. Dorsey wrote the lyrics in the aftermath of losing his wife Nettie and infant son while she was in labor. This hymn is still a song of comfort and a symbol of hope as we live our Christian faith through times of plenty and times of trial.

Albanian Dance is a setting of the popular Albanian tune "Shõta"by American composer Shelley Hanson. Hanson's career spans work as a conductor, clarinetist, record producer, and composer. Within this work for concert band, Hanson seeks to capture the festive mood of a raucous village dance that would be accompanied by a traditional European Brass Band. One of the prominent features of the work is long-long-short rhythmic pattern that is common in folk dances in many cultures and helps to propel the work forward.
