Yes, We Do Recycle!

Many students often ask if Messiah University actually recycles. The answer is yes, but it's also more nuanced than you'd expect. First, we need to consider what recycling is. Recycling is the process of transferring a waste product into a reusable material.

Second, we need to consider what can be recycled: Cardboard, aluminum cans, glass, and 1,2,5 plastics. Not all plastics are created equal. Even if the triangle recycling sign exists on a plastic container, if the number sign isn't 1,2, or 5, it's simply not recyclable at PennWaste. Additionally, if recycling contains food waste or other contaminants, it's not recyclable. This is why it's important to be aware of what items are recyclable and to choose to sort these items away from trash.

While recycling remains a good practice, it's ultimately not a permanent solution. An article from National Public Radio: How Big Oil Misled The Public Into Believing Plastic Would Be Recycled claimed the following: "All used plastic can be turned into new things, but picking it up, sorting it out and melting it down is expensive. Plastic also degrades each time it is reused, meaning it can't be reused more than once or twice". Many boundaries exist that prevent recyclable items to actually be recycled. Additionally, plastics have a finite number of times it may be recycled. Because of these short-comings, I encourage consumers to mindfully chose low packaging options, second-hand purchases, and quality over quantity.

Long story short: Messiah University recycles through PennWaste and it's better to recycle than not.
