

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

Rhonda Sider Edgington took her first organ lessons at Messiah University from her father, a long-time member of the music faculty. After years spent in Germany, she returned to the US and developed a special fondness for unusual and creative programming. As well as favorites of the organ repertoire, such as Bach (obviously!), and the French Romantic Vierne, there will be settings of spirituals by the Nigerian composer Fela Sowande. This program will also feature fresh sounds by young, living composers. You will hear lyricism in the writing of Brenda Portman from Cincinnati, the influences of pop and minimalism in the music of Nico Muhly of New York City, the spirituality of Navajo composer Connor Chee's works, and jazz influences in Chicagoian Marianne Kim's exciting pieces.


ABOUT RHONDA SIDER EDGINGTON



Rhonda Sider Edgington is often commended for her innovative programming, colorful use of registrations, and exciting playing. Seven years spent studying, working and performing in Bremen, Germany (originally with a Fulbright scholarship), led to her passion for the repertoire and organs of 17th century Germany, as she worked closely with Prof. Harald Vogel. Since returning to the US, she has expanded her focus to include newer works, especially enjoying highlighting women composers, and collaborations with other musicians.

She has envisioned and realized programs as creative as Music of Japan: for organ, marimba, and Taiko drums, with her duo Thunder & Wind (Carolyn Koebel, percussion); Jazz and the Organ, with Hammond B3 master Tony Monaco; and programs of music by all women for organ and trumpet with Great Lakes Duo (Dr. Brian Reichenbach, trumpet). Edgington is the Organist and Music Director at Hope Church, and teaches organ at Calvin University, while traveling to perform regularly around the US and in Europe. She also enjoys riding her bike, visiting farmer's markets, and writing a monthly column in the Holland Sentinel, her local newspaper.
