AI and the Challenge of Student Motivation

Professionals in many disciplines use AI tools and increasingly are being expected to use them to work more efficiently. But they were often trained to do the work "the old-fashioned way." This gives them the skill and experience needed to judge the output of an AI tool, use it effectively, and take responsibility for it. Our students need to learn both essential skills and how to evaluate AI output. How do we prepare them to do this? How do we persuade them that learning to work without AI is an essential part of preparing to work with AI?

Participants in this Teaching Innovation Lab will be invited to explore how AI is being used, or will likely be used, by professionals trained in their academic discipline. We'll consider together how to motivate students to work toward becoming competent in their fields, with and without AI, and think critically about AI assisted work. Teaching related AI resources will be provided to support participants.
